
Protect Your Finances

Get a copy of your credit report

A copy is free to ID theft victims. Ask that your file be “flagged” with a “fraud alert tag” and a “victims statement.” This will limit the thief’s ability to to open new credit accounts. New creditors will call you before granting credit. Insist, in writing, that the fraud alert remain in place for seven years, the maximum, according to the Privacy Rights.org.

File a Police Report

You will need a police report to dispute unauthorized charges for any insurance claims. This is absolutely necessary, regardless of the paperwork hassles. Also, fill out an “Online ID Theft Complaint” with the Federal Trade Commission or call 1-877-ID-THEFT. That enters your case in the FTC’s “Consumer Sentinel” database, a nationwide list of ID theft cases which can be used by law enforcement officers to find patterns and catch criminals.

Close All Compromised Accounts

The list may be wider than you realize. This includes accounts with banks, credit card companies and other lenders, and phone companies, utilities, ISPs, and other service providers. Dispute all unauthorized charges - The FTC offers a sample dispute letter on it’s Web Site. Disputes may require sworn testimony or statement and a police report. (Another good reason to have a police report.) The FTC also offers a form affidavit which can be used for the sworn statement at: www.consumer.gov/idtheft/affidavit.htm
